#### Summary of the event

The 5th Interregional Thematic Workshop of the RFC project was held as a hybrid event (online and onsite) within the RFC Study Visit - Historical Heritage in Transylvania, on the 21<sup>st</sup> of October, in Cluj-Napoca, at the National Museum of Transylvanian History. 14 participants were registered onsite and 18 participants online, gathering representatives of 6 PP and more than 6 stakeholders.







The topic of the ITW was chosen after taking in consideration the needs of the PP in their work of protecting the built heritage of their communities and regions. The workshop was designed to cover the status quo situation within the areas covered by the partners and to bring forward solutions that have been or will be implemented in the future.

Within the presentation "Potential and future development of the Terezin Fortress", Mr. Schmirler has included a short history of the fortress and detailed information about the stages of rehabilitation that have changed completely the looks and the role of this site from the Czech Republic.





The workshop continued with the contribution of project partners and stakeholders.

**PP4** stakeholder, Mr. Pănescu, has contextualised the protection of cultural heritage in view of the *EU Urban Agenda*, through the lens of the *Architects Council of Europe* and with the support of ICOMOS (*International Council on Monuments and Sites*) and EFFORTS (*European Federation of Fortified Sites*). When it comes to the situation in Romania, all fortifications are researched and listed, but the state of conservation varies greatly: from ruin to re-enactment. Some of the most prised examples of fortress rehabilitation in Romania are: Alba Iulia, Oradea, Arad, while others have merged with the evolving city, as in the case of Timişoara, or vanished in the landscape, as in the case of Clui-Napoca.





Mr. Dabaene, representative of **PP2**, detailed in the following presentation the differences between fortifications and urbanism as one versus fortifications and urbanism as separate. Jumping to the 20<sup>th</sup> century, when the will to bring back fortifications starts to appear, many fortresses from Belgium or The Netherlands can be mentioned as good practices. Some of them are partial reconstructions, some of them are perfectly integrated in the natural landscape and some have been integrated in the urban life. The conclusion of the presentation was that not all fortresses have to be national museums, depending on their specificity some can become adventure fortresses, university fortresses or even water fortresses.





Mrs. Kroneberg, representing **PP7**, described the evolution of the Magdeburg fortress, including its dismantling in 1920s. Within the city map of today, the fortress is part of the urban development process being protected and reanimated through *The monument preservation plan* and *The Integrated Urban Development Concept*. Today, the different parts of the old fortress form The Green Fortress Belt, its elements being considered as islands of "fresh and cold air" in the urban contemporary landscape.





**PP6** stakeholder, Mrs. Villalba, has started the presentation with some general facts about interventions on cultural heritage and especially on defensive architecture in Spain, mentioning the main pieces of legislation used in this domain. Although urban pressure is an important factor in the rehabilitation processes of many cultural heritage sites in Spain, in the region of Teruel the problem is the opposite one: the lack of urban pressure. The depopulated areas of Spain try to compensate the lack of opportunities with hunting for investments at all costs, even if these costs involve damaging the cultural heritage.



PP5 presentation, uploaded online on the project Drive, includes the history of Sabinov's fortification that dates back to he Middle Ages and it was probably formed at that time out of 13 towers, 2 gates and the walls. The restoration works were preceded by various research projects. In the 1970s two fortification towers were restored and, at the present moment, the Southern section of the fortification is being restored.
