





Project objective

Improve the **policy instruments** of the participating regions

- Public interventions at local, regional or even national levels can be addressed
- But at least one policy instrument per project must be an

Investment for jobs and growth goal programme

Who is eligible?

- Public authorities
- Public law bodies
 (bodies governed by public law)
- Private non-profit bodies



Policy relevance of partnership

Policy responsible authorities must be involved in the project:

- As partners for at least 50% of the policy instruments addressed
- As 'associated policy authorities' for the remaining policy instruments

Geographical coverage

- Four areas to be covered
- Mix of more and less advanced regions

North	Denmark, Estonia, Finland, Germany, Latvia, Lithuania, Norway, Sweden
East	Austria, Bulgaria, Czech Republic, Hungary, Poland, Romania, Slovakia, Slovenia

Scope of the second call

Open to all topics













Project activities

- Learning by exchanging experience (e.g., workshop, seminars, study visits, peer reviews) related to good practices identification & transfer
- Learning by doing: pilot actions from the start of the project or at mid-term (max one per policy instrument)
 - increased capacity of people and organisations

Implementation of activities

2 phases over 4-year implementation

- Simplified reporting
- faster control: less to check, more sampling (risk-based approach)
- Faster payments to projects

the 'policy responsible authority' status of organisations involved

 the geographical coverage: to clearly go beyond transnational cooperation areas



pilot actions: to be included only if they can be precisely defined
